New Play by UF Professor Opening February 13th Tells Real-Life Stories of African-American Students at UF *Gator Tales, on stage Feb. 13-22, examines 50+ years of integration at UF.*

Gainesville, Fla., January 30, 2015 — The University of Florida (UF) School of Theatre + Dance in conjunction with the UF Samuel Proctor Oral History Program will present *Gator Tales*, a new script devised and directed by Professor Kevin Marshall, Feb. 13-22, 2015 in the Black Box Theatre located in the Nadine McGuire Theatre and Dance Pavilion on UF's campus. Performance times are 7:30 p.m. February 13-14 and February 17-21, and at 2 p.m. February 15 and Feb. 22, 2015.

Gator Tales is a provocative drama that tells the story of African-American students at the University of Florida from the period of integration to the present. Performing before projection designs featuring iconic UF and historical landmarks and events, the actors being led by Marshall are taking on the challenge of portraying real-life individuals both honestly and accurately.

"The cast has a responsibility in this 'archival drama' of bringing to life people they've never met," said Marshall. "This archival drama that is *Gator Tales* highlights their extraordinary life experiences."

The character's stories are drawn from the oral history archive of the UF Samuel Proctor Oral History Program and the Alachua County African American History Project. Marshall received his MFA in Directing from Ohio University and has both produced and directed in his career. He has worked in New York City on staff at the Manhattan Theatre Club and Alabama Shakespeare Festival. Some of his directing credits at the university include *Scapino, The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (Abridged), American Western* and *Miss Witherspoon*.
