Shands nurse helps fight blindness in developing countries

andy Burnett, RN, who works in Shands AGH Ambulatory Care and Shands at the University of Florida Med/Surg Unit, volunteers aboard the world's only airborne teaching facility — the ORBIS Flying Eye Hospital.

The DC-10 jet serves as the hospital. Doctors, nurses and biomedical technicians from the developing countries that the flying hospital visits work alongside the ORBIS international medical team to exchange knowledge and improve skills.

"It is a multilayered program," Burnett said. "Our aim is to train the local eyecare community so it can better treat and prevent eye disease prevalent among their nation's population."

Since 1990, Burnett has visited Myanmar, Bangladesh, China, the Philippines, Vietnam, Costa Rica, Peru, Guatemala, Cuba, the Sudan, Ghana, Nigeria and Cameroon.

During her first visit last year to Enugu, Nigeria, Burnett taught the medical

staff a safer way to discard sharp medical instruments.

"I asked them to use the disposable water bottles as sharps containers," Burnett said. "It is gratifying to know they are still following the disposal method I suggested last year."
